

Fri. 22. 10. '26.

Contrary to discussions and meetings the day began with serious action. By the evening the Dharmashala and the Hospital was completely vacated save for a few bed-ridden patients. A large number of boys willing to return home also went away one after the other, including two batches of the boys that were sent to Nasik & Poona with ~~Prof~~ Harinath & Sener respectively at the cost of the Institution to be handed over to their parents there. There was a cricket match in the evening and a game of Pla-Patas in the night when tea was also served to all. Baba took a lively share in both the games. On account of these changes proper estimate of food consumption was twice miscalculated today. In the afternoon ~~the Rice & Dal was considerable~~

Dhal & Rice remained in surplus while in the evening the bread ran 'hopelessly' short. Baba insisted upon fresh bread being prepared for the boys and hence for the first ^{time}, the same was prepared as late as seven thirty o'clock.

Sat 23. 10. '26

At eleven o'clock in the morning Baba conveyed a fine silent lecture to the whole of the mandali on 'Mind' vide Chanji's note book. As for the rest, the general work of vacating the different premises and other arrangements in connection with the "Upheaval" were in full swing throughout the day. A cricket match in the evening and again (this time at Sailor's suggestion) a game of Ata-Pala was played by all in the night was played by all. Tea was also served at the end of latter game, after which by ten thirty o'clock all retired for the night.

Sun. 24. 10. '26.

The day began with the usual Bungo-killing and giving a sun bath to their belongings by the mandalis as is being done every Sunday since some time.

However there was also Ata Pala playing between 7.30. & 9 o'clock before another usual Sunday programme was gone through with, that is Dr Anjali Parman reading before all for two hours. The missing of some fruit salt from the bottle belonging to Anna caused quite a storm in the tea pot to be raised up. A special meeting was convened when Baba enquired of all as to who had taken that salt and none coming forward, at first, Baba threatened them that he would observe a 15

days fast - for the same but - the matter ended soon and Adi was asked to make good Huma's loss by getting him a new bottle. During the cricket-play in the evening Baba got hurt with a ball from Chanji but still he took part in Añ-Patas in the night.

The latter game proved very exciting ~~as~~ in spite of best attempts neither of the party could succeed in reaching the 'goal' till ~~11.30~~ ~~in~~ the 10.0'clock, upon which Baba offered the basket of Jalebis as a prize to the party who won the match the following morning. After the usual treat of tea a "council of war" was arranged there and then on the play-ground and the programme of duties for the mandali for future (from 1st Nov) was discussed upon. Some of the mandali were actually ~~decided~~ assigned certain duties while the rest were left pending and the meeting was dispersed at eleven o'clock. When after paying their respects to Baba the mandali got separated for the night.

Mon. 25. 10. '26.

The prize-game of Añ-Patas was played this morning from 7.30. to 9.0'clock under Baba's personal umpireship, and as a happy coincidence both the contesting parties could make the 'goals' equally and hence the basket of Jalebis was distributed equally amongst all with tea.

After the game a meeting was held, & the work of assigning duties to all under the changed conditions, left-pending overnight, was resumed. A very satisfactory distribution of different duties was made amongst the mandali by Baba

who also ordered the new programme to be brought into action from tomorrow. Besides the existing rules and regulations, some more were added (vide Regulation-Book) placing the whole mandali on equal footing as regards food, clothes and work.

The empty hospital premises were washed and cleaned out ^{in the evening} and the ~~the~~ school ^{to be} ~~was~~ removed here to enable its premises to be dismantled, ~~in the evening~~.

Following ~~the~~ a cricket play in the evening Babe and some selected members went to Kabe's place and enjoyed there a tasty dinner. Then at nine o'clock Atā-Patā playing was begun for an hour & a half and ended with a tea party. All went to bed at eleven o'clock in the night.
